

Emmanuel Lutheran Church Semi-Annual Meeting

July 15, 2018

The Semi-Annual Meeting was called to order at 1pm by President Craig Plymesser. Council members present were Craig Plymesser, Judi Raasch, Becky Denton, George Feazell, Leo Weinheimer, Lynn Christensen, Bart Boehm and Rollie Purdy. Myrna Gundel was absent.

Pastor Broers led the congregation with devotions.

There was an adoption of the order of business.

The secretary's report in the handout was from 2017, so Clella Buckner, Church Secretary made a copy of the 2018 meeting minutes, and Becky Denton, Council Secretary read the minutes to the congregation. Vicki Brown made a motion to approve the minutes as read, and Rhonda Boehm seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The Treasurer's report with the proposed 2019 Budget, the Vision Fund and the General Fund were reviewed by the congregation. Arlene Schwartz made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report and Wendy Feazell seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The Altar Guild Treasurer's Report and the Memorial Fund Report were reviewed in the handout. Lori Fox made a motion to approve the reports and Clella Buckner seconded the motion. The motion carried.

New Business:

Bart discussed the Property Report, and informed the congregation about the sewer gas smell, the sewer repair, the drains and the water heater.

Pastor gave an update on our Intern Pastor. He is coming to town this afternoon and moving into his apartment today. He will start his internship in August.

Leadership Policy — Craig explained the policy and there was a lengthy discussion. Kristi Broers made a motion to vote on the policy and Arlene Schwartz seconded the motion. The motion carried. Written Ballots were handed out to all of the congregation members to vote. The ballots stated: Yes to accept the Leadership Policy or No, decline the Leadership Policy. Ballots were picked up and one member of the Council and one member of the Congregation went into the parish hall to count the ballots. The results were: 18 yes and 25 no.

LCMC Resolutions – There was a discussion as to whether we wanted to follow our Bylaws and vote to have Pastors have a Master of Divinity Degree or not. Ed Christensen made a motion to have the Pastors to have a Master of Divinity Degree, and Jeff LaBarge seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Kathi Christensen made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Iris Westphal seconded the motion. The motion carried.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Thank you! I think it is appropriate to begin this year's Annual Pastor's Report with thanks to all of you for being so supportive of my family throughout the many adventures we have gone through during this past year. Your prayers, support and understanding have been very much appreciated especially for little Stephen who had many health issues over the last twelve months. I also want to thank you for your willingness to try new things throughout the year such as inviting Vicar Tony to be a part of our congregation and supporting his education here. I believe that he is learning a lot about how to be a pastor and about what a loving congregation looks like. I know that it is not always easy doing new things or being led by new people, but I believe that you have done a wonderful job of loving both him and my family as well. Thank you all so very much!

As I looked over the past year, I noticed that we have grown as a church in many ways, but some of them might seem very small at first glance. Thankfully Jesus said in Luke 16:10, "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much." I pray that we might continue to be faithful in both ministries that are just beginning as well as in ministries that we are continuing. For example, I take it for granted now, but it was only the past year that we created a set of policies for how to use our building, keep track of money/documents and deal with conflict. These were approved last January at our Annual Meeting. If you don't know what I am talking about, check out our website at www.fontanellelutheran.org and look under policies. This may seem like a little thing, but taking care of these little property and financial details will protect our church organization and keep us from falling into bad habits. We also began a Technology team that is continuing to work to support those who run our sound, cameras and Pro-Presenter each week. The work of these people might go unnoticed most of the time, but we would certainly notice if they were not doing such a great job!

I see our church growing in ministry in small but important ways as well. For example, last year was the first year (as far as I know) that we used estimate of giving cards to help us budget for the year. This might seem like a small thing, but in time, I hope that we can produce a yearly budget based on the plans of our community rather than simply guessing and hoping for the best. We have shown our generosity as a congregation in big and small ways. We helped out a family recovering from a fire with donations of money and clothing and we also supported multiple people through emergency benevolence and benefit meals/auctions. We joined together to clean up after a big storm this summer and we also supported and fed many dear families at funerals throughout the year. Both the big efforts as well as the small everyday kindnesses make a difference. One BIG success we had this last year was in the area of General Giving. We hoped to receive \$182,000 in giving and received \$180,500! As far as I can recall, that is by far the closest we have ever come to our goal in the nine years I have served as your pastor. When I consider the difficulties many people in our community are facing financially, I am overwhelmed by your hard work, dedication and sacrifice.

We have also grown personally in our faith as a community. By the end of the year, we will have trained another four people to be Stephen Ministers, taught tons of kids about Jesus through GROW and VBS and helped each other learn God's Word better through Bible studies, Life Groups and Sunday services. We have also committed ourselves to training a future pastor for the worldwide church in Vicar Tony. This has meant not only people giving of their time, such as those on the Vicar Support Team, but people being generous in giving money to the Vision fund focused on Mission.

At the beginning of this year, we tried to focus on our Loving Relationships. We have tried to find ways to love one another and the greater community in fuller ways. One small area that we felt we could do better at was thanking one another for what was done by writing our appreciation on a card in the front of our sanctuary.

These little messages might not seem like a lot, but the idea of being grateful and being appreciated is a HUGE part of loving and feeling loved by others. Our long-term planning team has encouraged us to join together more often as a community for things like potlucks and other church events to spend quality time together. I hope that you will seek to find practical ways that you might personally share your love for people both inside and outside of our church walls.

Our congregation also had some major challenges throughout the year as well. We have dealt with our share of conflicts, but part of being a loving congregation doesn't mean always getting along; instead, it means finding a way to respect one another and forgive each other even when we don't agree and even when we hurt one another's feelings. I am grateful that, even through some very difficult experiences, we have found a way to continue praising God together and sharing our lives with one another. I pray that our relationships with one another might continue to grow stronger.

Finally, during this upcoming year, we will continue to have opportunities to grow both in big and small ways. We will continue to teach and learn from Vicar Tony until his year of being a student pastor is over at the end of July. I pray that if you have not gotten to know him yet, you will make an effort to meet him, welcome him to your home or just have a good conversation with him. Starting on January 22nd, we will also be offering the Alpha Course which is an opportunity to meet together to ask questions about God, faith and the church together. It's for long time Christians as well as for skeptics and people unfamiliar with the faith. Overall, I pray that you each will seek to be more loving with one another and become more involved in your church community whether by joining a Bible study, coming to church more often, praying on your own or sharing of your time, talents and treasures. As one person, you may feel very insignificant, but together, our church community makes a big difference to our community and to the world. God bless you and thanks again! — Pastor Broers

VICAR TONY'S REPORT

I started my internship at Emmanuel Lutheran Church of Fontanelle on August first of 2018 after returning from a mission trip to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. It was a unique experience moving from the East Coast not knowing quite what to expect moving to Iowa, but I was following God's call and trusting in Him.

My first objectives were: to get settled in the apartment, get acquainted with the area, get familiar with the church activities, and to meet as many of the congregants as possible. Pastor Broers has been most helpful in introducing me to people, places and things around Fontanelle.

The regular meetings and activities within the church that I have been involved in for the past five months have been: serving in both Sunday Services, the praise team, Women's Bible Study, Prayer Group on Thursday morning, the Council, and for a short time participation in Grief Share and the Wednesday morning men's Bible Study. Other weekly involvement has been assisting and teaching in the G.R.O.W. program, which I continue to rotate through the different grades including Confirmation class. Not to forget the sermons preached every other Sunday. The exception to this was when Pastor Broers was called away for Stephen's surgery and for the passing of Kristy's brother-in-law where I stepped in to serve the congregation. I look forward to working with the Teen Bible Study group and I have a few ideas that may bring a new perspective. I feel strongly about daily prayer and therefore initiated a Daily Devotionals which has been added to the church Web-site. Another passion of mine is Bible study, so I started a Bible study on Thursday evening at the Olive Branch Restaurant in Greenfield. We have a steady attendance of about five persons each week. St. Paul's letter to the Romans is a very exciting book to learn Paul's theology which reflects and summarizes the other books in the New Testament.

My regular weekly duties, alternating with Pr. Broers include: providing devotions at Good Sam's, visiting the residents there, as well as weekly visitations with residents at Greenfield Rehab Center. I also call to make appointments with several home bound disciples on a regular basis and enjoy meeting and talking with those that are unable to attend church services.

Additionally, Pastor and I meet with our secretary Clella. We discuss past events and evaluate their effectiveness. We also discuss upcoming activities and how best to handle them for the best interest of the congregation. Clella has been most helpful and I value her assistance.

Stephen Ministry training on Tuesday evening is also part of my weekly schedule. Pastoral care, in my opinion is an important component of the ministry and this program provides important skills to provide this service to the congregation in and out of institutions.

Once a month I meet with the Vicar's support group. The purpose of this group is to go through the Certification Contextual Exercise. This is required by the Candidacy Committee of the L.C.M.C. for all candidates for ordination. The group is also to assist me in by transition to life in Fontanelle, IA and to evaluate compliance to our agreement. I am happy to say that all is going very well.

Also, on a monthly basis I meet with the traditional and contemporary worship planning committee. Additionally, I attend the ministerial group consisting of several of the pastors in the area every month to discuss providing aide to those in need within Adair County. On a quarterly basis Pastor and I meet with the Southwest Iowa, L.C.M.C. pastors to maintain an avenue of communications and discuss mutual, spiritual, personal, and church concerns.

Pastor and I meet with the Council president to confer on the health, upcoming issues and policies of the congregation on a regular basis. Pastor and I also meet weekly to talk about policies, how I am getting along, time budget, and many other factors involved in the ministry. This regular communication on various issues, concerns and factors in ministry is a valuable component in the learning process and I am grateful to Pastor for his time and commitment in my getting the most out of this vicarship.

I have also assisted with two funerals, and one wedding since starting here at ELC. Additionally, it has been my honor to conduct a burial of a loved one's ashes for a family.

I will be starting an Alpha Course this month, which is a program I was introduced to about ten years ago. Pastor felt it would be a good educational program which can enrich the spirituality of the church and the community. It is designed for life-long and new Christians or anyone with questions about the faith. The

founders after several years have provided the course for millions of people who feel it can answer the basic questions concerning the meaning of life. I hope you can join us and please bring a friend.

Two community groups that I have been involved with are the Lions Club and Boy Scouts of America. I think it is a good idea for church leaders to be visible in the community and show their concern and bring a Christian presence outside of the four walls of the church building. I have been welcomed and already enjoyed several activities from both organizations.

In conclusion, I feel that I am receiving an excellent internship experience here at Emmanuel Lutheran Church. It has been a very busy but enjoyable time meeting new people, sharing the love of Christ, worshiping together, and learning new ways of Christian worship and fellowship. I look forward to the next six months. God's Blessing for a happy and healthy new year.



Whereas the property currently owned by the church congregation is titled under three different names of "Trustees of German Evangelical Lutheran Church", "Trustees of Evangelical Lutheran German Immanuels Church" and "Emmanuel Lutheran Church";

Whereas in 1938, the German Evangelical Lutheran Emmanuel Congregation of Fontanelle, Iowa reincorporated under the name Emmanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church of Fontanelle, Iowa and restated the Articles of Incorporation in 1985. The church name was retained; and

Whereas the church and congregation are commonly known as "Emmanuel Lutheran Church"; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Constitution and Bylaws be revised:

- 1. on the cover page of the constitution to state "Constitution of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church";
- 2. on page 3 Article C1.01 of the constitution to state "The name of the congregation shall be Emmanuel Lutheran Church";
- 3. on page 3 Article C1.02 of the constitution to state, "For the purpose of this constitution and the accompanying bylaws, the Emmanuel Lutheran Church congregation is hereinafter designated as "this congregation";
- 4. on the cover page of the bylaws to state "Bylaws of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church"; and
- 5. on page 2 the first sentence of the preamble of the bylaws to state "As directed and authorized by Chapter 16 of the Constitution of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church, we adopt the following bylaws".



Outreach Report

We continue to search for someone who is interested in leading and organizing a group that would be focused on Outreach. But even without a ministry team leader, we have done a lot to both help those in need throughout Adair County and to share the gospel of Jesus with people who have not heard.

Besides the money that is given through the general offering for Benevolence to world organizations, local groups and the Emergency Fund, certain ministry teams in our church have made it a priority to find ways to help those in need. For example, our youth groups continue to reach out to share the good news with people. At GROW, we once again had a joyous time packing Operation Christmas Child Boxes. Our Confirmation class was given \$1000 to spend on Mission projects and they used \$500 to buy gifts for Operation Christmas Child and the other \$500 on gifts for two families (with a total of eight children). The High School packaged Meals from the Heartland and made two meals for the Ronald McDonald House. I pray that these experiences of generosity will lead to a lifetime of focusing on how to help others.

One way that we are seeking to become better evangelists to those around us is by talking about **God Stories**. At the recent LCMC convention, a speaker explained to us that we are sometimes very nervous about sharing our faith with others and yet, at the same time, we experience God's love, grace, discipline, faithfulness and leading all the time. A **God Story** is simply sharing a time in your life where you experienced God at work. We are trying to implement these into the Contemporary worship service and I would like to see us make it a part of ministry team meetings as well. If we can start to become comfortable talking about God with one another and paying attention to how He works in our lives, sharing our faith with others will hopefully become much easier.

Adult Ministry Report

We are still in search of someone who is interested in leading and organizing a group that would be focused on Adult Ministry at our church. And yet, there continue to be many people stepping up and doing what they can make sure this area of Spiritual Growth continues within our community.

One area that I have been very happy about is the area of Life Groups. After starting with twelve groups, we ended up only having three that survived . . . but they have really been thriving which is AWESOME! A special thanks to our life group leaders who take time to set up meetings for their group: Dan and Alyse Dreher, Wanda Johnson and Bob and Barb Queck! These groups seem to have a wonderful time getting together. If you would like to start a new group or become involved with a group that already meets, please contact one of the leaders above or Pastor Broers.

Thank you to George Feazell who leads our Adult Bible Study on Sunday mornings. I would encourage you to take some time and join the group as they learn more about God and His Word on a weekly basis. In addition, Vicar Tony started a Bible study on the book of Romans that meets at the Olive Branch on Thursday nights starting at 6:00. The group is fun, the food is great and learning about God's Word is FANTASTIC! Pastor Broers has been leading another Stephen Ministry training group starting this last Fall for four people. We will be commissioning them sometime in February to serve our congregation along with the three Stephen Ministers that continue their work as Christian caregivers.

Finally, we are hoping to soon empower you to become involved in the church in ways that fit your Spiritual gifts through using a Spiritual Gifts profile. When the time comes, I pray that you will not only fill out this form, but learn from it and take a step forward in faith to live out God's calling in your life in the area of ministry that you are most gifted for. God has given each of us gifts and He wants us to use them for His glory as well as to serve one another in our community.

Stewardship Committee

The Emmanuel Lutheran Church Stewardship Committee met several times this year. The focus of the meetings until June was to find an Intern Pastor since there were adequate funds to cover the expense of having an intern come to our church. In July, Tony Scalisi from New York agreed to come, and he started his training at ELC in August. During July, the committee prepared for his arrival by cleaning out a room next to Pastor Broer's office to serve as an office, and found furnishings for that room. We were also in charge of finding housing for him, and decided on the apartment above the Fontanelle Funeral Home, after making numerous inquiries into possible apartments that were for rent.

We met again in November to discuss sending out pledge cards again this year, which the church council had requested be done. Pastor Broers suggested that the cards be called "Estimate of Giving" this year, and the committee agreed. A letter from Pastor Broers and the cards were mailed to members. There was some discussion on what the next mission project should be, but no decision was made.

Technical Committee

This report will deal most specifically with our Audio/Visual (or sound) System in the sanctuary of our church which was installed new in 2007. It involves many microphones in various locations, amplifiers, speakers, computers, a sophisticated sound board, DVD recorder to record services, funerals, weddings, and other special events, CD player and a duplicating machine.

Every regular and special church service is sent to the Good Samaritan Center in Fontanelle by way of an under-ground cable that was buried prior to 2007 back in the days when Art Baudler was involved in the church. While this cable has served us well in the past, some problems have developed in recent years and we are exploring the idea of upgrading the way our church's signal might be sent to the nursing home wirelessly. No decisions have been made yet. We just know that residents at Good Samaritan truly appreciate our making our services available to them.

We experienced some problems with the audio, or sound, part of our system here in the church last summer. It was determined that a sequencer (an electronic device that turns on different parts of the whole system at intervals rather than all at once) had gone bad. This was causing some of the amplifiers that feed sound signals to the speakers to not power on at all. We were able to supply electrical power to these amplifiers from a different source temporarily but are looking at have to replace the faulty sequencer. An estimate of the cost would be \$1,000-1,200. The sequencer is a necessary part of the system to protect the components as they are powered up and powered down.

As expected, other components in the system have gone bad and have been replaced as needed, and things such as a computer have been upgraded when necessary to maintain best performance of the system. While it is approaching 12 years of age, it remains a viable and necessary part of our church. Visitors are favorably impressed with things we are able to provide to members and visitors attending events here, as well as supplying the television signal to Good Samaritan residents.

The sound system is operated by volunteers from the congregation who handle the different parts of the operation —sound, cameras, and computer (which provides words to songs, announcements, occasional videos, etc.). As people's work schedules and other factors change, there is some turnover in this group of volunteers. There is currently a need for more volunteers to work in the sound booth. Property Report

I wanted to provide the congregation with a 2018 year-in-review church property maintenance update. Our church is blessed to have an active Church Property committee that is led by Bill Raasch. Matt Gross, Bob Queck, Bob Jacobsen, Craig Plymesser, Dan Berg, and myself serve on Bill's committee.

2018 was a busy repair and maintenance year in terms of the number of projects completed. As I don't want our Emmanuel Congregation to gloss over these repairs and considerations moving forward, I want to detail them below.

March 2018 – Parsonage bathroom update after issues with leaking/dripping fixtures and faucets. New shower replaced the old tub.

April 2018 – McDermott and Son's Roofing of Atlantic replaced the flat roof membrane coating between the sanctuary and parish hall roofs. This has a 15-20 year guarantee with an annual checkup.

June 2018 - High winds damaged trees around the parsonage and the church. Many, many hands made short work of the debris cleanup. Severed trunks and big limbs on the north side of the church were "surgically" removed by Matt Gross with his loader.

June 2018 – one day before Vacation Bible School, one of the biggest AC units to the church quit. Bob Jacobsen and Matt Richards were able to piece the unit together despite local parts scarcity. Those AC units are now over 30 years old....and no company wants to make parts / controllers to repair the older units anymore.

October/ November 2018 – Handicap parking spots painted by Bill Raasch and Dan Berg. Bill also contacted masonry contractors and collected estimates for bricking the parsonage bathroom window that was removed/closed during the bathroom shower install. Brick laying to close this window will commence late spring 2019.

Basement Sewer Gas Smell/Drain Line/Bathroom:

In late July 2018, I contacted Mark Feick of Feick Plumbing and Heating and John Gruss of Schultz Plumbing and Heating to request bids for addressing the sewer gas smell/crushed crack drain lines beneath the floor of the basement bathrooms, non-working floor drains beneath the Sanctuary and Parrish Hall, non-working floor drain in Parsonage basement, and repair/replacement of our on-demand water heater. Both Mark and John were to design a plan to fix/address these areas and estimate an approximate cost. Feick Plumbing and Heating was the only contractor to provide an actual cost estimate. Both contractors mentioned 2 key concerns:

- 1. Final bill always takes precedence over estimate Massive amounts of hand labor to jackhammer out concrete flooring, remove material, and then pour new concrete over the new PVC drain lines.
- 2. Without an engineering/design plan, the "blue sky" issues for bidding on our project in relation to item #1 above leaves us vulnerable to low ball estimates but more costly overruns throughout the project.

Council voted at our November meeting to seek the help of a design and engineering team (Jerry Purdy of Design Alliance and David Losen of Twin Rivers Engineering Consultants) to design and standardize a plan that allows each potential contractor to bid on a project spec. With sewer gas smells being a high priority, Dave and Jerry want to be present when we smoke bomb the sewer line from the basement bathroom. They will then provide us an estimate for their design/oversight (typically based upon a percentage of the entire project). At this point, the council and congregation can accept or reject their design proposal.

Sanctuary Plaster Cracks:

With our electrical update now complete, we have started the process for repairing the cracks in the sanctuary plaster. Based upon local referrals, I met with Jerry Holan of Holan Construction. Jerry has agreed to work on the lower level crack repairs starting as early as January 26th. He will "trial" the middle section of the Sanctuary to determine labor and materials costs before he can give an overall project cost estimate. Jerry also mentioned four key considerations for our congregation.

- 1. The life of these plaster repairs will depend upon how stabile the Sanctuary is (cracks caused by shifting / settling building footings something that we are not addressing).
- 2. Height of plaster repairs will depend on his scaffolding/equipment.
- 3. New paint over the crack repairs will NOT match the existing paint 100 percent; we will try to get the closest match by taking large plaster chips to a color matcher at a hardware store/Menards.
- 4. Funerals / mid-week church activities may impede progress as scaffolding has to be torn down/reset. Thank you all for your continued patience as we continue to work through these property items in 2019.
